**STATUS REPORT #1: THE JUNE 3, 2008 STATEWIDE PRIMARY
ELECTION**

Crossover Ballot Working Group

The Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk convened a Crossover Ballot Working Group consisting of community groups and stakeholders with the goal of redesigning the confusing "double bubble" ballot used in prior primaries. The Group consisted of members of the California Secretary of State, California Common Cause, The Courage Campaign, The League of Women Voters, the Democratic, Republican, and American Independent Parties, the National Association of Latino Elected Officials (NALEO), The Braille Institute, the Asian Pacific American Legal Center (APALC) and the African American Voter Registration and Education Project (AAVREP). Discussions were held regarding ballot redesign, improvements in instructional material and a voter education plan.

As a result of these discussions, the Los Angeles County ballot was redesigned to eliminate the party choice requirement for crossover voters and now includes a pre-marked design that allows crossover voters to vote a Democratic or Republican ballot without voting for County Central Committee candidates which neither party allows included in crossover voting options in the June Statewide primary.

Please review the attached ballot design, Vote By Mail instructions and the sample ballot booklet which has been rewritten according the Working Group recommendations.

In addition we updated all poll worker training curricula and materials placing primary focus on proper polling place procedures regarding ballot dissemination.

Staff is completing a report that details the issue, the Working Group recommendations and the actions taken to eradicate the "double bubble" ballot. We will forward the report to you when it is complete.

VBM Ballot Mailings

We began mailing Vote By Mail (VBM) ballots on April 5, 2008. The first mailing focused on military and overseas voters who frequently receive mail later and must return their ballots to the RR/CC office sooner than voters who reside in the U.S. The second mailing began on May 1 and subsequent mailings will continue until May 30. To date we have mailed 548,188 Vote By Mail ballots and we have received 34,218 voted ballots. Non-partisan crossover ballot instructions have been included in all non-partisan VBM packets. Attached please find a VBM packet. The deadline to request a Vote By Mail Ballot is May 27.

Sample Ballots

Sample Ballot mailing began to the county's 4 million registered voters began on April 24 and is ongoing. We include a "Voter Alert" notice on the cover of non partisan sample ballot booklets notifying non partisan voters of the new ballot design. We also include "How To Use" and contact information for anyone with questions regarding their polling place or registration information in each pack. Vote by Mail applications are sent in every sample ballot pack with full instructions on how to apply and the deadlines for doing so. Voters can look up their sample ballot along with their polling place location at www.lavote.net. All online and printed materials are available in multiple languages.

Poll Worker Recruitment, Training and Online Poll Worker Program

Poll worker recruitment and training continues and we expect to have a full compliment of judges to staff all precincts in the upcoming election. We sent out a press release calling for judges to serve in typically hard to recruit areas and our focus remains on fully staffing all polling places. Our response from student and county poll workers is especially promising.

The Online Poll Worker Training program that the Board of Supervisors approved is operational. As a pilot project we are requiring Precinct Coordinators to complete the full course and pass the test in order to be placed. Coordinators are still required to attend in-person trainings in addition to the new online application. To date, 556 Precinct Coordinator candidates (70.5 percent) have taken the full course and 511 (92.5 percent) have passed. We intend to expand the program for the November General Election and will eventually require Inspectors, Coordinators and poll workers to visit the site and complete online training.

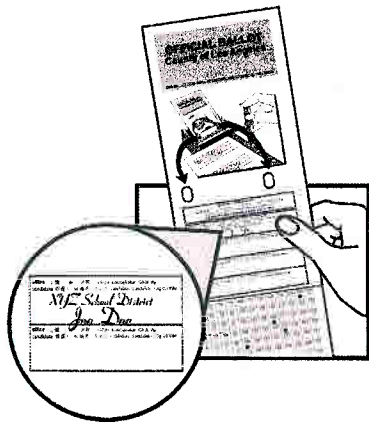
Braille Institute Voter Education Site

They will also be able to check their polling place locations and their registration status.

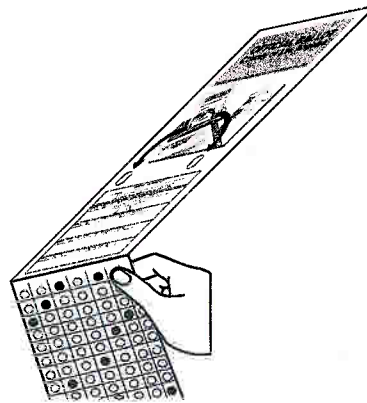
Write-In Voting Instructions

(Write-in votes are valid for qualified write-in candidates only)

TO VOTE FOR A PERSON NOT LISTED ON THE BALLOT:



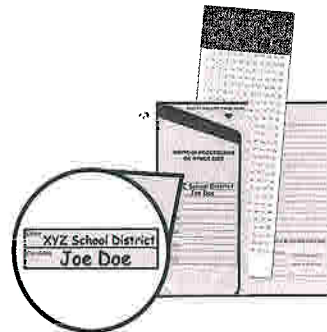
If you are voting at a polling location, write both the qualified candidate's office title and name in the space provided on the write-in long stub portion of ballot.



Fold stub over voted portion of ballot and return to pollworker.

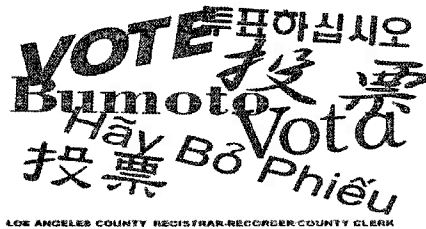
If you are voting a Vote By Mail ballot, write both the qualified candidate's office title and name on the inside of the gray write-in ballot secrecy sleeve.

Enclose ballot card in write-in ballot secrecy sleeve and place in lavender return envelope.



Do not write a candidate's name and also fill in a voting position on the ballot card for the same office. This will result in an over vote and your vote for the contest will not count.

LIST OF QUALIFIED WRITE-IN CANDIDATES, if any, is available at the polling place and is posted on our website at www.lavote.net eleven days prior to elections.

YES, IT DOES!

However, IT IS IMPORTANT for voters to:

1. Make sure bubbles for your choices are clearly marked.
2. Review voted ballot carefully for any **overvotes** or **undervotes**.



An "**overvote**" occurs when a voter casts votes for more candidates than the allowable number to be elected to an office; or casts both a "yes" and a "no" vote for a ballot measure.

An "**undervote**" occurs when a voter does not cast a vote for a specific contest or ballot measure; or when multiple votes are permitted (such as a "vote for no more than three") and a voter casts fewer votes than the maximum number allowed.

Overvotes and/or undervotes **do not** affect the votes cast for other contests and ballot measures, nor do they result in rejection of the entire ballot.

IMPORTANT VOTER NOTICE

Pursuant to California Elections Code section 13305, in Primary Elections the County Central Committee of each qualified political party may place a party contribution envelope or letter into the sample ballot mailed to their party's registered voters. Costs for participation in this program are paid for by the respective political party. The Libertarian Party will not conduct County Central Committee Elections for the June 3, 2008 election.

VOTER NOTICE CONFIRMING RESIDENCE

Many voters move each year and neglect to re-register to vote at their new address. It is important to maintain an accurate voter registration file for conducting elections. Therefore, after the General Election in November, a **Confirmation Postcard** notice will be mailed to those voters who have not voted in any election for a period of **four (4) consecutive years** and whose registration has not been changed in any way during that time.

Voters who receive such a verification postcard **must respond to the postcard within 15 days of the date of the notice in order to remain on the Active Voter File and continue receiving sample ballots and other election material.**



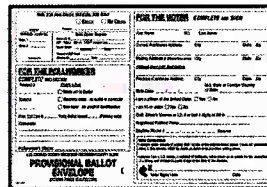

Vote at assigned polling place. Precinct assignments are based upon voters place of residence. Provisional Voting rights. Registered voters are entitled to vote provisionally when registration or absentee voting status cannot be determined at the polling place. PERMANENT VOTE BY MAIL STATUS

Your name will be deleted from the Permanent Vote By Mail list if you fail to return your voted ballot in any two consecutive statewide general elections in accordance with Elections Code Section 3206.
